SA: 46 000 MW capacity (only 60% available at any given time)



32 000 MW used at peak times



WHAT HAS BEEN DONE TO ADDRESS THE ENERGY CRISIS

IN RECENT WEEKS, EXTENSIVE:

Hard work by Eskom employees
Law enforcement interventions



SINCE 2018

- Bid window 4 added 2000MW of solar and wind
- Bid window 5 added 2 600MW
- June 2021: increased licensing threshold from 1 MW to 100MW (80 private sector projects produce combined capacity > 6000MW
- Eskom making land available for RE projects to yield 1800MW
- Eskom's 1st solar/battery projects to yield 500MW
- Bid window 6 to increase wind and solar from 2600MW to 5200MW

- Engineers from Private Sector
